Citizens of the City of Prineville,

On behalf of the City staff and leadership team, we present to you the biennial 2022-2023 budget for the City of Prineville.

The total balanced budget for next biennium 2024-2025 is \$120,735,730. The General Fund portion of the budget is \$20,942,481, with capital spending at \$23,092,700.

Each year the Prineville City Council holds multiple workshops to review and update our mission statement and council goals. The City Council and staff regularly review quarterly financials and City projects. The budget planning process is supported by input from 10 active committees made up of elected officials, citizens and staff. The finance team and department leaders strategically update our long-range models for City operations and services, and align our budget with adopted council goals that are tied directly to budgeted departmental goals.

The City of Prineville's budget for 2024-2025 continues to gain in financial strength and stability, while providing our customers with essential City services. We are proactively identifying challenges and developing solutions to position our community for future success.

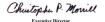

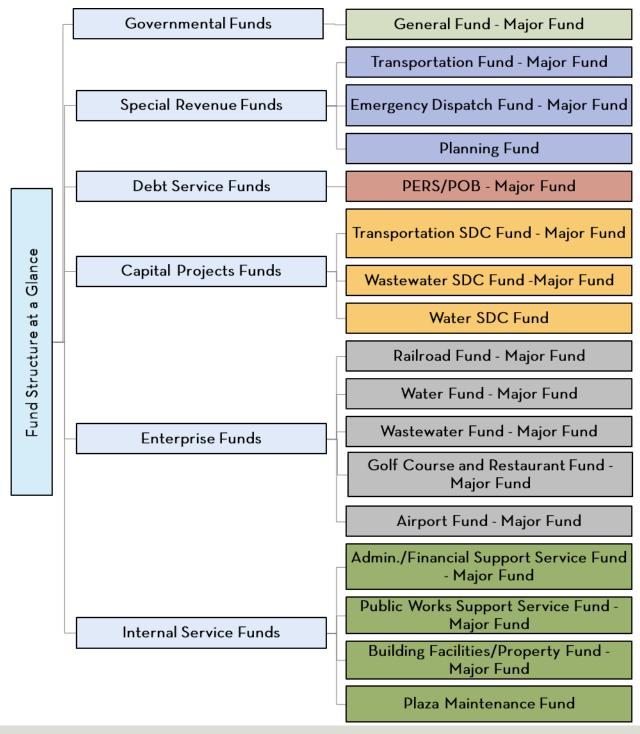
Mission Statement Adopted February 9, 2016

Beginning in fiscal year 2020, the City of Prineville began a biennial budget process. Budget totals, revenues and expenditures by fund, and amounts shown by type of expenditure are shown for a two-year period. This budget period begins July 1, 2023 and goes through June 30, 2025 (BN 25). This process allows for more effective use of staff time to focus on long-range strategic planning and modeling, processes and policy.

Fund Structure



The City's fund structure includes six different fund types and 17 funds. All funds in the fund structure are appropriated funds in the BN 25 budget.

Explanation of the Goal

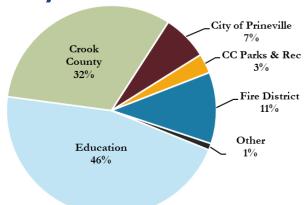


Community Safety

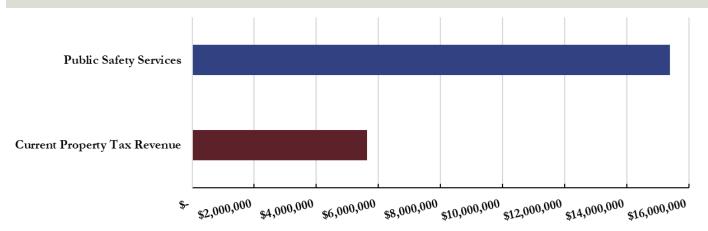
Explanation of the Goal

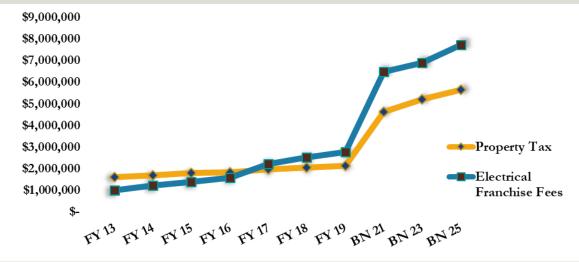
Where Do My Property Taxes Go?

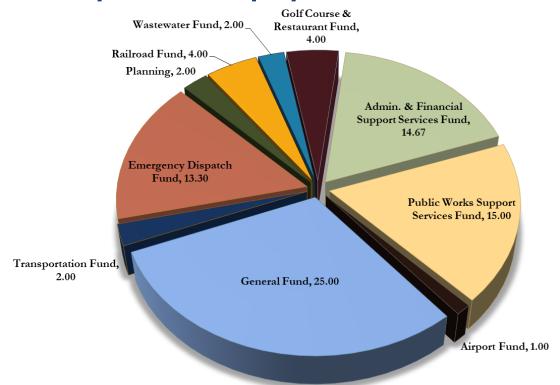


The remaining funding needed to pay for public safety services comes from franchise fees, intergovernmental sources, transient room taxes, and other fees and charges.



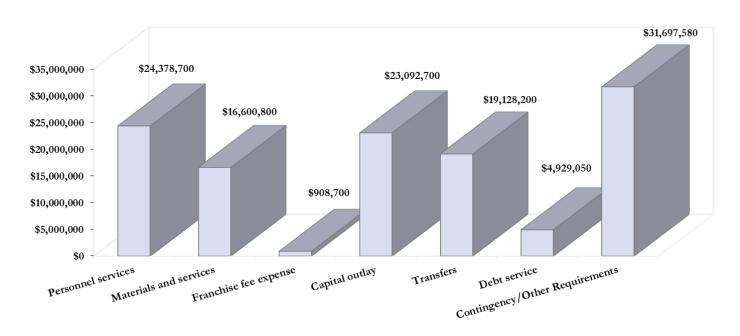
In the next biennium, franchise fees are estimated to increase roughly \$800,000. This is made possible by the expansion of the data center projects in our community.

Expenditures By Type

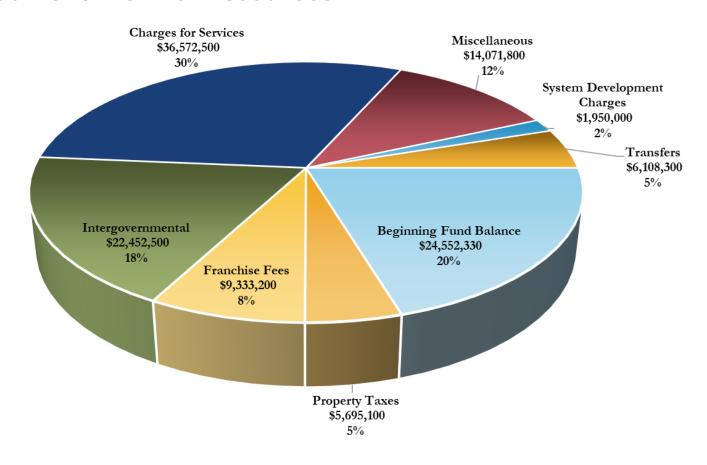

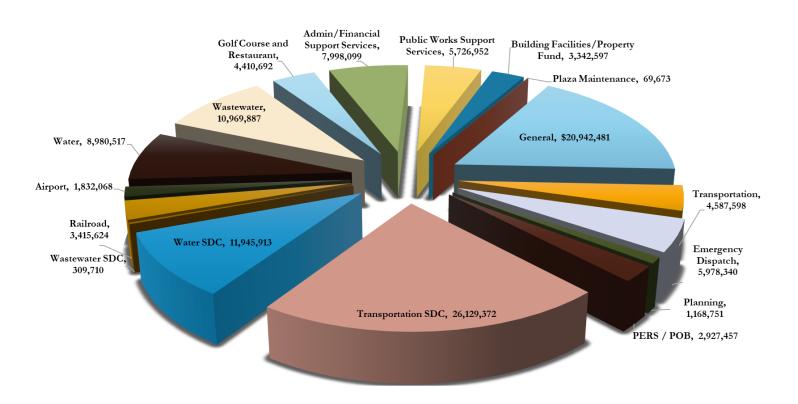

Current Biennial Expenditures



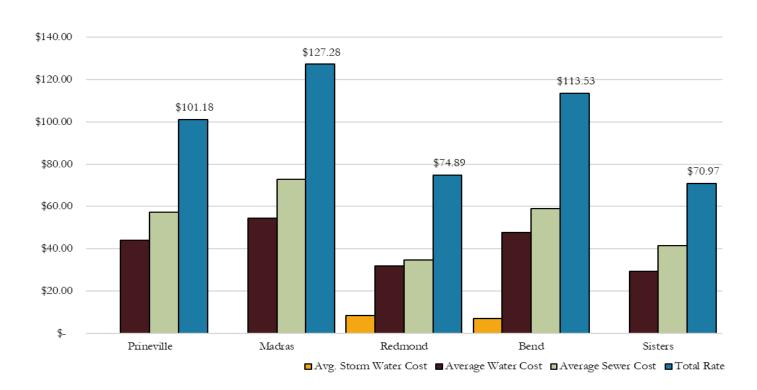
Water and Sewer Rates for BN 25



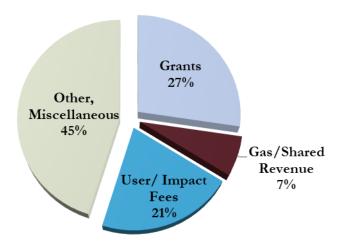
In FY 24 and FY 25, base and commodity water and sewer rates are budgeted to increase by 3 percent. Sewer commodity rate increases will not affect residential customers.

Rates for FY 24-Average 7,500 Gallons of Water Use

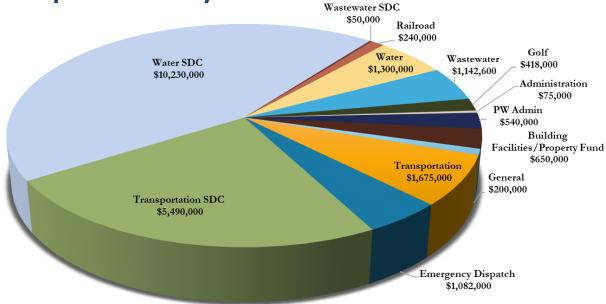


Capital Resources By Type BN 25



Of the \$23.1 million in capital improvements, \$6.3 million will be paid for through grants, \$1.5 million through intergovernmental revenue, \$4.8 million from user fees and fund balance, and \$10.4 million from franchise and other miscellaneous fees.

Capital Expenditures By Fund BN 25



The largest capital project in BN 25 is in the Water SDC Fund, totaling approximately \$10.2 million for the construction of a new water storage tank and distribution line. The second largest project is in the Transportation SDC Fund totaling \$4.5 million for the Combs Flat Road to Peters Road extension project. Emergency Dispatch is getting a phone system upgrade budgeted at \$842,000. In the Building Facilities Fund, significant projects are budgeted in the Barnes Butte Department for trail paving and paving the parking lot. Other budgeted capital amounts are primarily for recurring infrastructure maintenance and upgrades. BN 25 Significant Capital Projects

Project Title: Airport Storage Tank & Distribution Line Department: Water SDC



Project Description

The Airport Area Tank and Waterline Resiliency Project will provide increases to both the storage and distribution capacity of the City's water system. The project will increase storage capacity and provide increased fire flows serving the airport industrial area of the city. It will include an additional 1,000,000 gallon above ground storage reservoir and additional water distribution lines.

Key Drivers for CIP Project / Analysis of Need

As the City of Prineville grows, demands on the water system increase. This project was identified as necessary for serving the airport industrial area. That area has grown significantly in the last several years.

Project Title: NE Combs Flat Rd. Extension to Peters Road Department: Transportation SDC



Project Description

The adopted 2013 City of Prineville Transportation System Plan identified the need to create an additional north/south connection within the City transportation network. To accomplish this, the extension of NE Combs Flat Rd. to NE Peters Rd. was identified. In 2017, the City purchased 460 acres from Brooks Resources which now allows for this connection to be made. The facility is currently under design with the hope that stimulus funds may become available to construct.

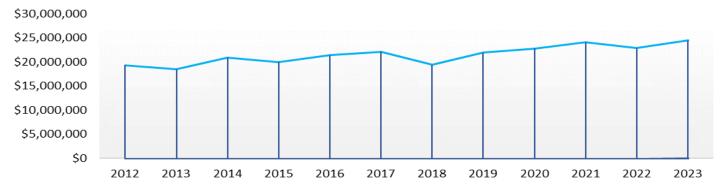

Key Drivers for CIP Project / Analysis of Need

The extension of NE Combs Flat Rd. to NE Peters Rd. will greatly increase north/south connectivity within our community. Currently, only N Main St. provides this connectivity. If N Main St. is closed, a five mile detour is required. This road extension will alleviate this issue and is identified in the adopted City of Prineville Transportation System Plan.

(Unaudited and estimated as of June 30, 2023)

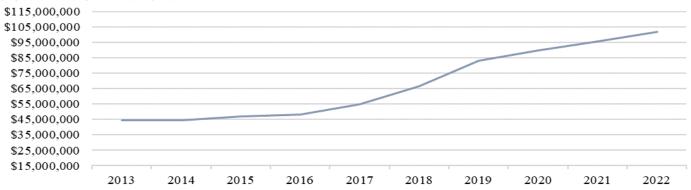


City's Total Debt Per Capita History

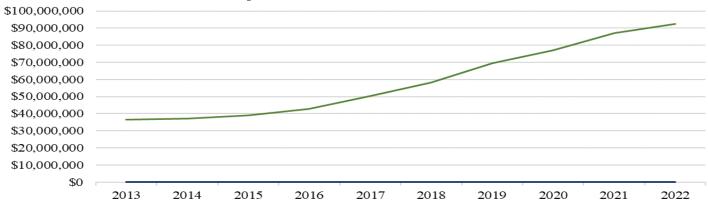
(Unaudited and estimated as of June 30, 2023)

Is the BN 25 budget balanced?

Yes, the City of Prineville's BN 25 budget is balanced at \$120,735,730.

What is the City's permanent tax rate?

\$3.0225/\$1000 of taxable assessed value.

What type of citizen oversight is provided during the budget process?

The Prineville Budget Committee approves the budget, comprised of an equal number of citizen members and elected officials. Citizen members have a number of votes equal to the elected mayor and city councilors.

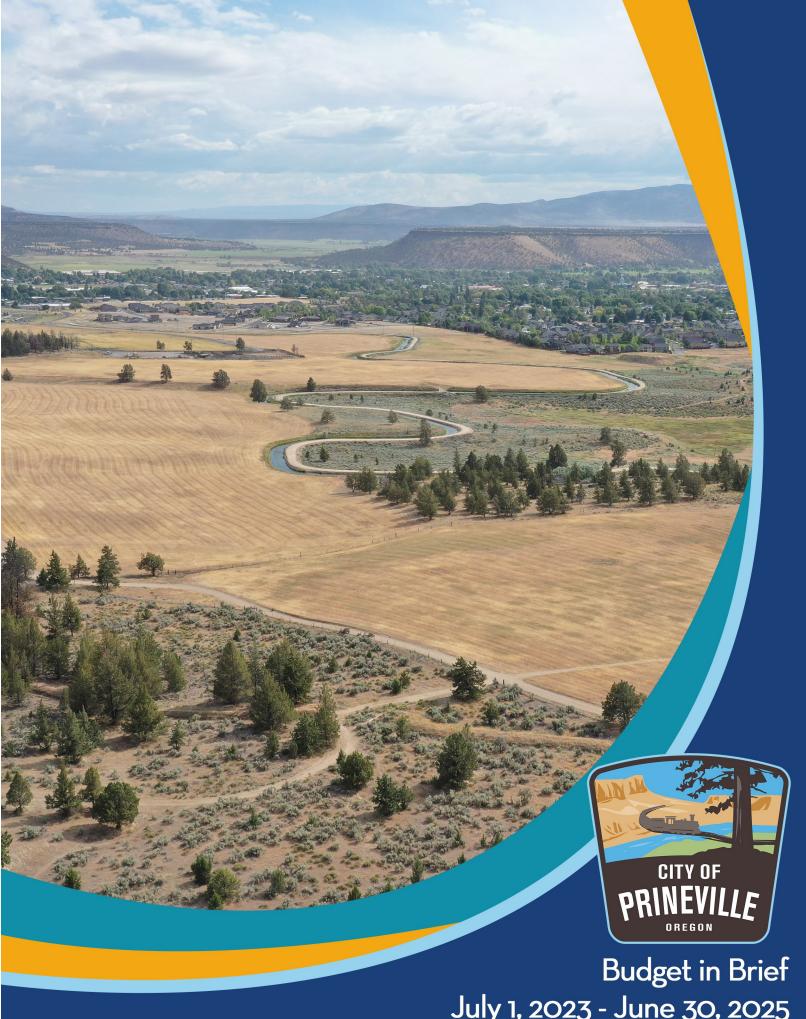

Did You Know?

- The Transportation Department supports not only City departments, but also outside partners such
 as Crook County Parks and Recreation. In the last biennium, the department assisted in the paving
 of the basketball courts at Ochoco Creek Park.
- The Aquifer Storage and Recovery project, completed in BN 23, will store water during periods of
 cooler temperatures and low demands in the airport industrial area aquifer. This water will later be
 recovered during periods of higher temperatures and higher demands.
- The City's debt to total assets ratio is roughly 17 percent as of June 30,2022. This means that only 17
 percent of the historical costs of all the City-owned assets are currently leveraged with long-term
 debt.

Budget Document Facts

- The City of Prineville submits its budget annually to the Government Finance Officer Association (GFOA) for the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award Program.
- The budget is reviewed by three different reviewers, giving us suggestions on how to create a
 document that communicates better, is a better operations and financial guide, and a better policy
 document.
- For the 17th consecutive year, the City of Prineville was awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.
