WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program can provide for a strong region-wide conservation program; and

WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program can resolve disputes over rights to existing power; and

WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program can preserve the independence of local public and private utilities and retains the decision-making authority at a local, sensitive, and responsible level; and

WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program can present the populace of this region with the opportunity to develop a program for the Pacific Northwest by the citizens of the Pacific Northwest; and


WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program will provide long-term power supply contracts to facilitate future planning and eliminates the uncertainties in availability of power supplies; and


WHEREAS, a regional power supply and conservation program can guarantee a long-term power supply to existing industries, thus guaranteeing jobs and a stable economy for the future,
